Pre-School Room

The children in Pre-School have been learning about Countries from around the World. They have explored India and enjoyed taking part in making and tasting Indian food. They enjoyed visiting Paris celebrating Valentines Day by making chocolate mousse. We have also visited Nigeria, reading "Handa's Surprise" and acting out the story in the tuff tray.

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Things to do at home this month

Pre-School

The children in the Pre-School room will be learning about Spring. You can join in at home by going for walks in a nearby park or garden and look for signs of spring. Encourage your child to find specific items like flowers, buds, leaves, insects, or birds. You could plant easy-to-grow seeds like sunflowers or herbs in small pots and talk about growth and responsibility as they water and care for their plants.

Foster creativity and fine motor skills through creating art with a Spring theme, such as painting flowers, making handprint butterflies, or crafting tissue paper flowers. You could also read books related to Spring such as "The Hungry Caterpillar" by Eric Carle.

Toddler room

The children in the Toddler Room are going to be focusing on the theme of animals. You could play a simple animal snap game using animal cards. You can imitate animal sounds and movements such as the roar of a lion! Sing animal related songs such as "Five Little Ducks".

You can read animal themed books such as "Dear Zoo" and enhance your child's language skills. You could also bake animal shaped biscuits using the recipe below. Why not develop your child's creative skills by asking them to create an animal picture using different textures for different types of animal skins.

Baby Room

The Babies are going to be focusing on the Farm. You can fill trays or containers with materials such as rice or dried beans to hide farm animals and your child explore the textures and find the animals. This type of activity is great for your child's sensory development.

You can read farm themed books such as Peekaboo books. Add farm animals to the bath and sing songs at bath time such as "Old Macdonald" or "Five little ducks". You can go out for a walk in the countryside and look at the different farm animals and then draw pictures of any that you have seen using chunky crayons when back home.

Sugar Cookie Recipe.

Ingredients

100g unsalted butter, softened
100g caster sugar, 2 eggs
1tsp vanilla extract 30g cornflour
300g plain flour. **Method.**

Beat the butter and sugar with an electric whisk for 4 mins until light and fluffy. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, then add the vanilla. Whisk in the comflour and plain flour until the mixture comes together into a dough. Put the dough between two pieces of baking. parchment, and roll out to a 6mm thickness using a rolling pin. Chill for 30 mins

Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Peel the top layer of parchment off the dough and stamp out circles using a 6cm round cutter (or the shape of your choice). Transfer the cookies to a second large baking sheet lined with baking parchment, spacing them 2cm apart. Bake for 7-10 mins. Leave to cool.
